### **About Ethnicity**

Kommentar

The study of societal change and ethnic relations has been a core pursuit in Sociology and Social Anthropology, in the past and in the present, and often occurs in historical contexts marked by heightened migration (Haas et al. 2020, Massey 2008). This course aims to refine the theoretical understanding of social and cultural processes regarding the formation of ethnicities and ethnic diversity (Yancey et al 1976, Bös 2010). In a first place, the readings of the course explore the field of migrants and migrant descendants, wherein conceptual debates on self-perceptions, modes of belonging, group formation, and collective subjectivities continue to be at the core of theoretical considerations (Cohen 1974, Glazer and Moynihan 1975, Banton 2008). In so doing, the course's discussions will also go beyond this context: we will analyse the genesis and continuously shifting social forms of ethnicities, which is heuristic-ally important in that it can help us clarify processes of social, cultural, and political change in society at large (Bell 1975, Bös 2011, Banton 2011).

Kommentar	<p>Das Forschungsfeld Religion und moderner Tourismus hat sich in den letzten Jahren vor allem im Umfeld der Tourismus-Forschung etabliert. Für den deutschsprachigen Raum ist hier besonders die 2010 erschienene Publikation von Michael Stausberg zu nennen. Sie wird uns als theoretische Basis dienen, von der aus wir unterschiedliche Ausdifferenzierungen in den Blick nehmen werden. Vor allem der boomende sogenannte Spirituelle Tourismus (Wallfahrten, Klosterreisen etc.) sowie die kulturelle Praxis der Besuche religiöser UNESCO-Welterbestätten eignen sich für religionswissenschaftliche Analysen.</p>

Kommentar	<p>„Fundamentalismus“ ist ein schillernder Begriff, der in vielfältigen Kontexten Verwendung findet. In dieser Veranstaltung wollen wir klären, wie der Begriff im Rahmen von Soziologie und Religionswissenschaft verwendet wird. Dazu werden wir uns ebenso mit Gruppierungen befassen, die als fundamentalistisch gelabelt werden, wie mit Diskussionen rund um den Begriff „Fundamentalismus“. Voraussetzung für die Teilnahme ist neben einer kontinuierlichen Teilnahme an den Sitzungen, die Bereitschaft größere Textmengen (auch in englischer Sprache) intensiv zu lesen, also auch sich aktiv in projektorientierte Gruppenarbeit einzubringen. Die Teilnahme an der ersten Seminarsitzung ist verpflichtend, da hier unter anderem Arbeitsaufträge vergeben und Arbeitsgruppen für das gesamte Semester gebildet werden.</p>
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## Research Debates

### Settler Colonialism In and Out of Palestine

**Kommentar** This class is an interdisciplinary exploration of the cultural, political, and religious manifestations and implications of settler colonialism. Co-taught by a scholar of Literary Studies and a Religious Studies scholar, it will engage with forms of political expropriation and exploitation that characterized the colonial venture from its very beginnings and persist into our days. In doing so, it will look closely at the ideological ramifications and narratives around the practice. Settler colonialism is arguably the most versatile and tenacious form of colonial organization. We will be concerned with the ways in which settler colonial ideologies organize particular racial and ethnic relations of difference, on the grounds of geographical, political, and religious (constructions of) distinctions and oppositions. The class will first aim to gain a larger idea of the discourses and critiques of settler colonialism. In its second half, it will zoom in on the very exemplary case of Israel/Palestine and reflect on this case's logic and implications both on the grounds of theoretical and narrative texts. Please check StudIP as the semester approaches to find out about the reading material.

**Content note:** In the service of our collective learning and growth, this course may include a variety of challenging and potentially sensitive topics.
